PURPOSE AND OVERVIEW (max 5-10 sentences)		
<p>Discussing the phenomenon of ancient imperialism from the perspective of theory of identifications, social positioning and postcolonial studies. Introduction to and problematization of imperialistic discourses and their material articulations in the Greek, Hellenistic and Roman worlds. Familiarization with previous and current theoretical and methodological approaches dealing with ancient imperialism and critical evaluation of interpretations stemming from them. Problematisation of political, social, economic and cultural effects various forms of imperialisms had on communities within and beyond their immediate spheres of influence. Consideration of modern perceptions of ancient imperialisms and their utilization in political, ideological, cultural and academic spheres of recent societies.</p>		

LEARNING OUTCOMES (knowledge and skills)
Acquiring theoretical and methodological basis for further research of ancient imperialisms; familiarization with previous approaches, their contributions and shortcomings. Introduction to basic types and sets of evidence on ancient imperialisms and potential for their utilization for academic, educational and other purposes.
